Summary of December 15, 2020 Session Meeting

Deacons:

- Reported 53 took Communion in November

From the Pastor Not exactly a Christmas Miracle

There is certainly no shortage of Christmas movies both old and new for us to watch. As if the Hallmark Channel wasn't enough, now streaming services are producing Christmas movies too. We all know how the story in these movies goes. There is a person (we will call this person "bad person") with some sort of power or authority that no one really likes. Often times, because of their personal ambitions, they nearly always put themselves above the welfare of others. There is another person (we will call this person "good person") who

is full of love. They always put others ahead of their own needs. Usually, they could be far more successful if they would just leave their old life behind them, but their heart knows it belongs to their situation in their current world. Usually, this person is having some financial issue and all problems can be solved if they simply turn off their moral compass, just this one time. There is always a group of secondary characters connecting with the main characters to move the story along.

So, the story goes like this. Bad person needs something. The good person is either in possession of said item or has the ability to influence the, "powers that be." Bad person steps out of his/her "world" and moves into the "world" of the good person. We see this as the, "world of real people." Good person and the people around them influence bad person in such a way they have a change of heart. They turn away from all the things that kept them mired in the bad person's "world" and become a good person.

Now, before I get too high and mighty about how my taste in Holiday movies is so much more refined, this is the same plot device in, "Santa Claus is Coming to Town," where Chris Kringle melts the heart of the Winter Warlock. "Elf," where Buddy melts the heart of his father and all of New York City. "Christmas Vacation," where Clark melts the heart of his boss. The Grinch, Miracle on 34th Street, all of the "Santa Claus," movies, Polar Express, Fred Claus, and yes, even, "A Christmas Carol." By the way, this plot model in a movie is so good, it doesn't have to be Christmas. Sandra Bullock made a ton of money using this plot device in, "Two Weeks' Notice" and "The Proposal." In one of the movies, she played the good person and the other, the bad person.

Do you want to know why we are all such big suckers for this very simple plot device? Because in its most simple form, it is the story of us and our relationship with God. In our story, we are the bad people. Our own personal ambition continues to make us put ourselves first. Even the best of us, those who always serve others, the Mother Theresa's of the world. Even those people, fall short of giving God the love and commitment His glory so deserves. But God loves a good plot device, so he decided to leave His world and come into ours.

He came to our world as an infant, poor and born in a stable. It is the kind of story that would begin to melt the heart of even the most jaded person. He grew up in what we would call today, a "blue collar" family. Worked with his hands at physical labor. The kind of, "Salt of the earth" upbringing everyone can appreciate. When that infant grew into a man, he started his ministry of changing the hearts of the bad people. But here's where the story takes a crazy turn. The hearts of the "bad people" didn't turn to good. Certainly, there were quite a few among those who followed Him, but not the kind of numbers the plot line demands. No, for that, God had to take the story one step further. For that to happen, He had to be willing to let his own Son die.

You see, we don't live in a movie script. A cute little baby, the appreciation of a hard day's work, or even the wisest teachings are never going to be enough to change our hearts. For that to happen, we need God to step in and do something. No Christmas movie expects a not happy ending. The miracle of Christmas didn't come at Christmas, it came at Easter when Christ chose to take on the sins of all the bad people so that God would see them through the goodness of his Son. The Christmas Miracle also came at Pentecost when God sent the helper of the Holy Spirit to be our guide in this broken world. By breaking the script, our hope was truly found. We could stop relying on ourselves and start relying on God. Our Christmas movie is not a story about our redemption, it's a story about the power of God's love.

NEWS Mission Moments

"Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I have commanded you. And behold, I am with you always, to the end of the age." Matthew 28: 19-20

As the New Year begins, new horizons and opportunities also emerge and there is much to look forward to for our missionaries who are serving the Lord through their mission work to share and spread the Gospel to the unreached.

Missionary Dan Smythe, after 14 years in his ministry work with the Global Training Network – "Training the Untrained to Reach the Unreached" is leaving the Global Training Network in a leap of faith and will be volunteering as an Ambassador with The Timothy Initiative. First Presbyterian Church Missions Ministry Team will work with Dan as a partner account and he is assigned as our Ambassador to connect with us throughout the year with regard to our partnership in the ministry of The Timothy Initiative. The Timothy Initiative expands his mission work in the process of training new church planters Internationally in the unreached countries of the world who lack access to the Gospel.

Missionaries, Ryan and Amy are following God's lead and have moved to another country in Europe where there are many, many more opportunities and freedoms for them to use their gifts to build up churches and help in the work of outreach. The move has been difficult in settling in and transitioning in their new country and COVID has made it even harder than it normally would be. But, their personal belongings have finally arrived from being held in storage because of COVID and they are unpacking and were able to have Christmas in their new home! Ryan thinks this move will prove to be a very strategic home base for their mission work in serving the Lord.

With Laundry Love suspended because of COVID, our partnering church in the Laundry Love program, the United Methodist Church of Hanford, has started a local Cleaning Supply Bucket Outreach Project and First Presbyterian Missions Ministry Team was able to make a donation to support this local outreach effort from unused 2020 Laundry Love budget funds. The cleaning supply buckets are distributed to families in need to ensure that they have critical cleaning supplies. Packed with special care, each container holds supplies that help prevent the spread of COVID and include items such as hand sanitizer, bar soap, gloves, laundry detergent, all-purpose spray, sponges, liquid dish soap, powdered cleanser, as well as other essentials.

Let us welcome the New Year with thanksgiving and praise to the Lord for bringing us through 2020 and giving us a fresh start in 2021. Please remember to pray for all missionaries whether overseas or on our own home field, for their safety, needed resources in their mission ministry, and that doors will be opened for them to continue to share the Word of God!





We will not have our planning meeting in January since we do not know when and what will be open. Also, we have no place to meet as many places are closed down.


