KGM Banner Year

Our Deacons proudly support the Kings Gospel Mission (KGM) with regular monthly donations. You are encouraged to read the semi-monthly "Impact Report" posted in the fellowship hallway. KGM had a positive impact on the homeless within our community last year.

Accomplishments for 2021 include:

- Provided hope and encouragement to 369 men and women in their overnight shelter
- Served 5,387 meals to their overnight guests
- Housed 16 men and 5 women in Room & Board
- Operated a 6-man New Song Academy (a oneyear Christian discipleship program)
- Provided a Mobile Shower Unit as outreach for individuals living on the street
- Operated pressure-washer cart services (providing downtown cleanup and work for men in the shelter)
- Operated two Recycling Centers (Armona and south Hanford).

They also have great plans for 2022 including:

- Industry/Food Court in south Hanford (food & jobs for new housing)
- South Hanford Development (24 more affordable housing units built, bringing a total of 48 in a courtyard community setting)
- Massive expansion of workforce housing using "sleeping cabins". Up to 48 more beds throughout the city to house those who will work for their stay.

You may have also noticed recent improvements in the grounds at church. Every two weeks a crew from KGM pulls weeds, trims bushes, cleans sidewalks and pavement. KGM appreciates FPC Hanford's support and invites you to "like" Kings Gospel Mission on Facebook to stay connected.

"DTS" **EPC World Outreach Global Workers**



What does DTS stand for you ask? It stands for "Discipleship Training School" and Missionaries Rupesh and Susanna are EPC World Outreach missionaries who work to mobilize and train disciple-makers among Muslims. They met at the First Presbyterian Church in Redding, California and although they grew up on opposite sides of the world, they both were raised in Christian homes and have known Christ all their lives.

As a young man, Rupesh became involved with and was serving on staff with "Youth With A Mission" in his home town and then was promoted to the Youth With A Mission base in Redding, CA where he and Susanna met and were ultimately married.

Rupesh and Susanna are two of EPC World Outreach's most resilient global workers. They sensed God calling them to work in mobilizing and training disciple-makers among the Muslims and they connected with EPC World Outreach and entered into the assessment process. In 2019, the EPC World Outreach Committee appointed them as global workers and they ran their first DTS – Discipleship Training School from the fall of 2019 to February 2020. But then, the COVID Pandemic hit and they had to undergo many changes with their program and in location, but their response was always the same – "Thank you Lord. Your plans are better than ours. Show us how to glorify You in all this". Since that time, and with guidance from the Lord, they now oversee and run a DTS program overseas.

A discipleship training school is 5 months long. The first three months is called the "lecture phase" where the students learn about and also engage in worship, intercession, and quiet times. Weekly topics such as the Character & Nature of God and Bible Overview are discussed. The students live in community and have ministry opportunities to start preparing for the second phase of DTS which is the "outreach phase". In the outreach phase, students go to different locations and are fully focused on sharing the gospel with others over the course of two months.


If anything changes for a possible event in April I will let you know by either the bulletin or a call from me.




