"Builder Or A Wrecker?"

Have you ever been given a nickname? A nickname is a substitute for the proper name of a person, place, or thing. It is commonly used to express affection, amusement, or a character trait. A nickname can be used to defame someone as well. In Acts 4, we read about a man named Joseph, but the apostles gave him a nickname. They referred to Joseph as "Barnabas" which

meant "son of encouragement." Joseph had distinguished himself as one who would walk into the lives of others and offer encouragement. What a great nickname and character trait to have. We learn in Acts that Barnabas was instrumental in the Apostle Paul's life. He was also significant in the life of Mark.

To encourage and believe in others could be one of the most precious gifts we could give. It is extremely easy to see people for their past mistakes or their flaws. It is not difficult observe another's weaknesses and imperfections. Our world desperately needs more people like Barnabas...people who can look beyond the surface of others and see the beauty within. We need people who can see our potential and not our pasts. Barnabas helped to lift the lid on other's lives by simply encouraging them. Barnabas was a builder of people. This reminds me of the following poem:

Soup Kitchen

Your First Presbyterian Church Deacons have provided monthly financial support for the Soup Kitchen at Episcopal Church of the Saviour in Hanford for a great many years.




For 37 years, the Soup Kitchen has provided a daily meal for anyone who has had the need for it. From hungry children on school break, the working poor, and the homeless to the elderly who cannot prepare meals any more, everyone is welcome to eat at the kitchen without qualification or questions. In addition to providing sustenance for the body, the Soup Kitchen also provides a sense of community and often hosts community services to help support those who are being fed. The soup kitchen feeds between 80-127 people a day (2,413 -3,831 people a month) at \$4.86 per meal or an average monthly overhead of \$13,917.00. This "overhead" is the cost of ensuring the soup kitchen can operate with minimal staff necessary, maintain the property, ensure the dining room and kitchen are clean and compliant with Health Department Food Service regulations, purchase necessary supplies to prepare and serve food, and pay the bills for insurance and utilities. The average monthly income from grants and donations is \$4,745.00, leaving a \$9,172.00 monthly deficit.

Soup Kitchen cont.

The Soup Kitchen is in desperate need of financial support in order to keep their doors open and continue to provide daily meals to the needy in our community. There is a regular ongoing need for volunteers to cook and serve the meals and for donations of food and supplies. The current need is for corporations, organizations, families and other groups of 6 or more individuals to be the "Guest Chef" for the day - where a group sponsors the cost of the soup kitchen for one day at \$300.00. The Soup Kitchen volunteers will help the "Guest Chef" volunteer group prepare and serve the meal and experience the story and community you helped support. Sponsorship can be arranged with Michelle at soup@ecsaviour.org. Your tax deductible one-time or recurring donations of any size may be made by using the soup kitchen giving link found at www.ecsaviour.org or sending a check to the Soup Kitchen at Episcopal Church of the Saviour, 519 Douty Street, Hanford, CA 93230. Maybe you could get 5 friends together and each chip in \$50 to be the Guest Chefs for the day! Or maybe you could ask your employer or organization if they can provide the \$300 and you and your work mates could be Guest Chef. Pray about if the Lord would like you to help in this way and do as Isaiah 58:7 says: "Share your food with the hungry, and give shelter to the homeless."

Please help us again this year. Our Shoe That Grows kickoff will begin on Sunday, Sept. 3. Forms will be provided in our weekly Sunday Worship Bulletins. We will accept paid orders through Sunday, October 1.

The Shoe That Grows has 5x the impact of an ordinary shoe because it expands 5 sizes and lasts for years.

Over 105 billion people suffer from soil transmitted diseases worldwide. Without shoes, children are especially vulnerable to diseases and parasites that can cause illness and even death. Children who get sick miss school, can't help their families and suffer needlessly. And since children's feet grow so quickly, they often outgrow donated shoes within a year, leaving them once again exposed to illness and disease.

The idea of The Shoe That Grows was founded by a gentleman named Kenton Lee who had traveled to Nairobi, Kenya after graduating from college. He lived and worked at a small orphanage with some incredible kids. One Day, he was walking down a dusty road with the kids and noticed the little girl next to him had on shoes that were way too small, the toes of the shoes cut out and her toes were sticking out. And the idea for The Shoe That Grows was born.

The nonprofit organization Because International was started to serve as the structure to get The Shoe That Grows to as many kids as possible who are in desperate need of footwear to protect their feet.

In 2022, over 35,000 pairs of The Shoe That Grows were distributed in 36 countries around the world and many jobs were created in Mombasa, Kenya as a result of shoe production.




BodyLife Dinner
