"Do You Trust Me?"

The blockbuster movie *Titanic* tells the tale of how, on that ill-fated

voyage, Jack Dawson (Leonardo DiCaprio) won the affection of a wealthy young woman named Rose Bukater (Kate Winslet). Although Rose turns Jack away at first, she yearns inside for someone to break her free of her dismal life. She says, "Outwardly, I was everything a well-brought-up girl should be. Inside, I was screaming. I felt like I was standing at a great precipice, with no one to pull me back, no one who cared or even noticed."

In the famous scene of the movie, Rose has decided to give their romance a chance and has sought out Jack on the bow of the ship. When he sees her change of heart towards him, he reaches out to her and says, "Take my hand." He asks her not to speak but to close her eyes, and then he leads her to the very bow of the ship. He has her stand up on the railing, while he holds her steady. He asks Rose, "Do you trust me?" She responds, "I trust you."

The scene radiates as the sunset streaks in the background. As Jack stretches out her arms over the bow and tells her to open her eyes, she's overwhelmed by the beauty of the waters and the sunset before her. All she can say is, "I'm flying!" Rose is being rescued from a predictable and passionless life and invited to pursue something more.

This is what happens in our new life in Christ. Christ extends himself to us and commands graciously: "Take my hand." Then he asks one simple question, "Do you trust me?" What follows is pure adventure. "Do you trust me?" In the next few weeks, I want to challenge you. I want to challenge you to trust Jesus with <u>all</u> areas of your life. Why? Greetings from the Deacons!

Hello! Along with the boxes for food, clothing and shower ministry donations, there is now a box for old electronic devices! The box is in the Fellowship Hallway with the other boxes for donations.

NCADV (National Coalition Against Domestic Violence) provides a program where you can donate any cell phone, in any condition, and the following:

Phones

Mp3 Players

Laptops

- chargers
- GPS systems
- cases, etc.
- Digital Cameras
- Video Game Systems

NCADV will refurbish and resell 60% of our donated items. The money they earn supports the programs that help end violence in the home. The other 40% of the donated items will be recycled according to current environmental standards.

Theses donations are tax deductible. If you put your name and e-mail address on a card in a bag of donated electronics, NCADV will send you a tax receipt after Cellular Recycables determines the value of your donation.

If you are worried about personal information left on your device, NCADV says you do not need to wipe your information clean, as the devices are sold for parts, and new software is installed in each reusable item. If it cannot be resold, it will be crushed for recycling.

NCADV will use its profits to assist victims of domestic violence by finding them resources to help them remain free of abuse. The group supports legislature goals to end domestic violence, and helps fund resources around the United States to help end domestic violence in the home.

It's been a bit since our committee has shared an update. We have been busy getting acquainted with our new pastor, Pastor Tim Brown! He is leading our congregation on an exciting new path in our worship and service to our Lord.

You should have received your giving statement recently. Hope you found all in order with our records of your tithes and offerings. If you have any questions, let Athena, our bookkeeper, know. One thing the giving statement shows is if you have given your "Asking" offering yet this year. "Askings" is our \$36 per member request which helps support our local Evangelical Presbyterian Church (EPC) Presbytery and national EPC General Assembly. Our own church and pastors' families have been recipients in the past of support from our Presbytery and National organization because of these funds! If you have not given your "Askings" yet, please consider doing that soon!

Now for something new! Our Stewardship process will happen earlier this year and in a different way. Pastor Tim has been presenting a sermon series called "Jump" and it is on the topic of Stewardship and Trust. The series will conclude on October 15th. On that day, you will receive-a "Commitment Card," to prayerfully consider. These Commitment Cards will have several choices for you to make. This is different than in years past as none of those choices will be asking you to pledge a certain amount of money to FPC in 2024! Instead, you will be asked to make a commitment between you and God. We will be receiving these cards at the conclusion of our service on October 15 and Pastor Tim will be the only one to see these Commitment Cards and he will be praying over them and for you and your commitment for the next 90 days. Additionally, under Pastor Tim's leadership, Session will be building a "Faith Based Budget" for 2024 with the hope of seeing the giving increase by 10% above this year!

We have seen all that God has done for us here at First Presbyterian Church Hanford and want to continue to please Him in all we do. Financial planning and Christian budgeting are not just about money. It's also about our values, goals, and how we want to live. We want to make a positive impact with our ministries in our community and around the world! We look forward to an exciting 2024 ministry year!

A Note From:

Children's and Youth Director Sheri Winterowd

It was my great joy to work with our students and adult volunteers to prepare and deliver the Youth Sunday worship service on Sept 10. Our theme for the morning was TRUST. It is my hope that you might find encouragement in this article, to reinforce this theme.

The gospel of John, chapters 14- 16, relates a conversation between Jesus and his disciples in the Upper Room, immediately following the Last Supper on the night before he was crucified. This is often referred to as The Upper Room Discourse. For our purposes, I want to focus on the part where Jesus tells his disciples that they will be hated by the world, and that he is going to be leaving them and will send the Helper (who we know as the Holy Spirit) who will guide them (and all his future followers, including us) into all truth. As part of this teaching time with his disciples, Jesus says "I have said these things to you, that in me you may have peace. In the world you will have tribulations. But take heart; I have overcome the world."

Many times when young people see and hear countless images and statistics of the sad, negative, heinous, awful things that humankind does to one another, it can be hard to trust in a good and loving God. When we add to that natural disasters like fires, tsunamis, hurricanes and floods and all the suffering that is caused to innocent people, we have to face those who say "how could a good and loving God allow this to happen?" There is a story in the Sept. 2023 Our Daily Bread devotional of a young boy who took a LIFE magazine cover from July 12, 1968 which showed a horrifying photo of starving children in Africa during a civil war into his pastor and asked "Does God know about this?" The pastor replied, "I know you don't understand, but yes, God knows about that." The boy walked out, declaring he was uninterested in such a God. Winn Collier writes,

"These questions disturb not only children but all of us. Alongside an affirmation of God's mysterious knowledge, I wish that boy had heard about the epic story God is continuing to write, even in places like (Africa). Jesus unfolded this story for His followers, those who assumed He would shield them from hardship. Christ told them instead that 'in this word you will have trouble.' What Jesus did offer, however, was His promise that these evils weren't the end. In fact,

He'd already "overcome the world" And in God's final chapter, every injustice will be undone, every suffering healed. Genesis to Revelation recounts the story of God destroying every unthinkable evil, making every wrong right. The story presents the loving One whose interest in us is unquestioned." Let's hear again Jesus' comforting words in John 16:33 "In the world you will have tribulation. But take heart, I have overcome the world."

Seeking to glorify God with our lives by our words, our attitudes and our actions fuels the desire to do what we can to meet people in their places of need and be the hands and feet of Christ, as we seek to put our full trust in Christ and be a witness for Him.

Operation Christmas Child

Samaritan Street

"Every box is an opportunity to reach a child with the Gospel of Jesus Christ" (Franklin Graham)

The mission of Operation Christmas Child is to demonstrate God's love in a tangible way to children in need around the world. Through this project, Samaritan's Purse partners with the local churches worldwide to share the Good News of Jesus Christ and make disciples of the nations.

Our church has been participating in Operation Christmas Child for many years. Have you wondered about the history of OCC?

In the summer of 1993, Samaritan's Purse President Franklin Graham received a call from a man in England asking if he'd be willing to fill shoeboxes with gifts for children in war-torn Bosnia. Franklin agreed, but figured Christmas was months away. He forgot about the promise until he received a call back around Thanksgiving asking about the gifts.

Franklin asked his friend, the late Pastor Ross Rhoads of Calvary Church of Charlotte to see if he could help with the need. One Sunday shortly afterwards, Pastor Rhoads demonstrated for his congregation how to fill a shoebox with simple gifts and encouraged them to include a letter as well. Within weeks, the church had 11,000 shoeboxes lining their hallways!

Due to their generosity and with additional gifts from Canada, Samaritan's Purse sent 28,000 shoebox gifts to children in the Balkans that Christmas. Through these gifts, OCC communicated to children and their families what the angel said to the shepherds about Jesus' birth: "I bring you good news of great joy that will be for all people" (Luke 2:10, ESV)


Since 1993, more than 209 million children in more than 170 countries have received an Operation Christmas Child Shoebox. The project delivers not only the joy of what, for many of these children, is their first gift ever, but also gives them a tangible expression of God's love.

Samaritan's Purse estimates that there are 7,000 "unreached people groups", in places that very few missionaries have gone to, if at all. In 2022, 99 of those "unreached people groups" were reached by Operation Christmas Child, who every step of the way, prayed and gave the greatest gift – the gift of Jesus Christ.

Our church is once again participating in Operation Christmas Child. We launched our OCC Purchase Program to provide school items, clothing, toys, hygiene items, along with the current Shoe That Grows campaign, to pack into shoeboxes during the OCC Packing Party, after Worship on Nov. 5.

In October, Operation Christmas Child Shoeboxes will be available for those that prefer to pack their own! We ask that those be returned to the church to be blessed along with the other boxes on Nov.12 and we will deliver them to the area drop off location during the following week. Your Missions Ministry Team thanks you for your generous support of our Team and project Operation Christmas Child.

Remember, every box is an opportunity to share the story of Jesus Christ.
