#### "Approaching the Father"

Let us then approach God's throne of grace with confidence, so that we may receive mercy and find grace to help us in our time of need. (Hebrew 4:16)

We are learning about the power of prayer here at First Presbyterian. As I was preparing for the sermon series entitled "Unleashed," I came across the following story. During the American Civil War, a young soldier in the Union Army lost both his older brother and his father in the Battle of Gettysburg. The soldier decided to go to Washington D.C to see President Lincoln to ask for an exemption from military service so that he could go back home and help his mother and sister with the family farm.

When he arrived in Washington, he went to the White House. Approaching the front gate, he asked to see the president. The guard on duty told him, "YOU can't see the president, young man! The president is a very busy man! Now go away, son! Get back out there on the battle lines, where you belong!" While sitting on a park bench not far from the White House a little boy came up to him and asked what was wrong. The soldier began to share his sad story. The little boy listened and said, "I can help you, soldier." He took the soldier by the hand and led him back to the front gate of the White House. Apparently, the guard didn't notice them because they weren't stopped. They walked straight to the front door of the White House and walked right in.

After they got inside, they walked right past the generals and high-ranking officials, and no one said a word. The soldier couldn't understand what was happening. Why didn't anyone stop them? Finally, they reached the Oval Office—where the president was working—and the little boy didn't even knock on the door. He just walked right in and led the soldier in with him.

There behind the desk were Abraham Lincoln and his secretary of state, looking over the battle plans that were laid out on the desk. The president glanced at the soldier and then looked at the boy with a smile. "Good afternoon, Tad. Can you introduce me to your friend?" And Tad Lincoln, the son of the president of the United States, said, "Daddy, this soldier needs to talk to you." The soldier pleaded his case before President Lincoln, and at that moment he received the exemption from the war that he desired.

#### **Meet Mercy Ships**

"Praise be to God, who has not rejected my prayer or withheld his mercy from me!" Psalm 66:20

Don and Deyon Stephens had dream of converting a ship into a floating hospital to bring safe, free surgical care to those who needed it most. They left their home in the United States setting out into unfamiliar waters. There were six of them: Don, his wife Deyon, and their four children.

Mercy Ships began their mission in 1978 to provide hope and healing to those in need. Each year, hospital ships filled with volunteer professionals who selflessly provide life- changing surgeries to children and adults who otherwise would go without.

Today, four and a half decades later, Mercy Ships has impacted more than 1.2 million medical and programmatic beneficiaries and performed more than 110,000 life-changing surgeries. In the first half of 2023. More than 1,100 volunteers served on board the brand new *Global Mercy*.

Because 50% of the world's population lives near a coast, Mercy Ships can provide more surgeries for more people with their floating hospitals. Their state-of-theart hospital ships are the most efficient way to deliver free services. Their programs include training local professionals, providing new medical tools and resources, renovating facilities, and more.

Over the past 30 years, Mercy Ships has been based exclusively in Africa, serving the nations of Benin, Cameroon, the Democratic Repulic of the Congo, the Republic of the Gambia, Ghana, Guinea-Bissau, Ivory Coast, Liberia, Madagascar, Senegal, Sierra Leone, South Africa and Togo. Bringing hope: hope for progress, hope of healing, hope to touch someone's life, hope for a better tomorrow.


